RE-IMAGINING OUR SPACE

The Elting Library is committed to serving and supporting New Paltz teens. In 2022, our team focused on developing a teen space that was welcoming and offered tech tools and resources, comfortable seating, study space, and a diverse collection.

Our programs allow teens to explore their creativity, connect with peers, and access educational resources. Events such as the *Teen After-Hours* and *Battle of the Books* (middle school and high school teams), *Early Gen-Z Queer Hangout (partnered with Hudson Valley LGBTQ Center)* are arenas for self-expression.



THE HAVILAND-HEIDGERD HISTORICAL COLLECTION ANNUAL REPORT

The Haviland-Heidgerd Historical Collection (HHHC) is the non-circulating research section of the Elting Memorial Library. Considered the best genealogical and local history collection in the Mid-Hudson Valley, it is a repository for primary source material and published works relating to the Hudson Valley. Its strongest focus is on the town and village of New Paltz.

A remarkable highlight of 2022 was that HHHC Coordinator, Carol Johnson assisted the FBI and Historic Huguenot Street in recovering two Ammi Phillips paintings that were stolen 50 years ago.

It was nice to welcome many patrons from out-of-town back to the collection in 2022. Besides genealogical queries we have been able to help a motion picture company find locations for their filming of a documentary on Sojourner Truth and, a Ph.D. student research the murder of Daniel A. Hasbrouck in 1870, as well as achieve the designation of Floyd Patterson's house onto the historic register. We also have been assisting Esi Lewis with the Dr. Margaret Wade-Lewis Black History Cultural Center.

In August, HHHC did research on headstones that were found in local barns. With the help of Eddie Moran of Huguenot Street, all were identified. Three of them were for local Revolutionary War soldiers.

Another highlight, was the preservation, conservation, and digitalization of 3,973 pages of 17th and 18th-century documents through an NEH grant. HHHC has been updating old digital exhibits that were housed on the Hudson River Valley Heritage website.

Our volunteers clocked more than **772** hours during 2022. Our dedicated **10** volunteers include: Marilou Abramshe, Dave DeMers, Shayna Murphy, Patrick O'Donnell, Linda Paquin, Joan Scandariato, Dede Smith, Ann Thek, Sally Vasse, and Anne Wandres - thank you!

The bulk of their hours were spent updating our house books. We have had a **record-breaking number** of patrons wanting to research their homes and in most cases, we have been able to help them trace their land to the first division of the New Paltz Patent in 1760.

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OUR LIBRARY COLLECTION

Using our Collection Policy as a guide, staff focused on updating our collections. The majority of the items that were weeded included out-of-date, damaged, and unpopular materials.

Library staff increased our promotion of the library's collections through social media, in-house signage, community flyers, our website, and displays and forward-facing materials within the library. Collections and furniture were rearranged to provide comfortable seating.

Libraries today offer a variety of materials in various formats. In 2022, Elting purchased more digital content than ever before. These purchases were based on public demand, user recommendations, and library resources. We even added a Library of Things full of useful tools, games, equipment, and more!

Throughout the library, patrons will find QR codes. These codes provide a quick link to relevant online information, services or resources.

Our staff provides reader advisory for our patrons. Through display, staff picks, book and movie tournaments, book bingo and similar activities, the staff helps patrons locate items of interest in our collections. As a result, there has been an increased circulation in all areas of our collection.

Our patrons borrowed 16,153 items from neighboring libraries




LOANED

Neighboring library patrons borrowed **13,824** items from our library.



BABIES & PARENTS

At Elting, we believe that it is important to provide programming and resources for babies and their caregivers. In 2022, Children's Librarian, Miss Kim offered over **5 5** programs for this audience.



CHILDREN'S

ADULTS & SENIORS

At Elting, we offer tons of programs for our adults and senior citizens. We also facilitate the use of our space for outside groups. In 2022, James Frauenberger, Adult Programmer coordinated over

270 programs.

TOTAL ADULT PROGRAM PARTICIPATION: 1,252

The Elting Memorial Library offered more than **520** programs in 2022, serving everyone from toddlers to teens to seniors.

Elting Library also offers a wide variety of programs for our adult users, including art exhibitions, music performances, book discussions, and hands-on art class for adults.

We offer programs, services, and resources that focus on equity, diversity, and inclusion. Our children's programs are using the STEAM approach. STEAM Education uses Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Mathematics as access points for guiding student inquiry, dialogue, and critical thinking.

Our Summer Reading program includes all ages, including baby parents/caregivers. This program helps prevent "summer slide" when students forget what they learned in the prior school year during the summer.

The Elting Memorial Library began to offer the free nationwide program 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten in 2022. This program is designed to help parents and caregivers connect and prepare their children for kindergarten by reading together. Numerous studies show that reading to children at a young age has a direct positive impact on their cognitive development and later academic success. Reading aloud to your child will not only help strengthen language skills and build vocabulary, but will also provide quality bonding time and create memories that last a lifetime.

ELTING MEMORIAL LIBRARY

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We could not do all that we do without the help of our community! The Library works closely with many local groups and individuals.

In 2022, Elting Library began working closely with the Town of New Paltz. This partnership has benefited both the Town and Library. We share materials, resources, ideas, and programming space and performers. We are active members of the *Thriving Together* group through the Town's Office for Community Wellness.

Elting Library was able to provide public meeting space for the Village of New Paltz when their space was undergoing renovations.

Last year, local schools returned for visits!
We hosted field trips for nursery school
through college students. We also visited
schools for open house or information days.

We partnered with other nonprofits and organizations like *Next Year's Words* and *Roost Studios*. Demand by local nonprofits and clubs continues to increase. They have used our resources to promote their causes, including the collecting of food, coats, and menstrual products, and for art displays, meetings, events and programs.
