

Greetings New Paltz,





ADULTS

Adult Programs in 2023: 175

Participants: 1,200+

2023 saw continual growth in adult programming. We continued to host popular ongoing programs such as the Elting Book Club, our weekly Knitting Group, Music on the Hill, and Early Gen Z Queer Hangout with the Hudson Valley LGBTQ+ Center. We also branched out and tried new programs such as Chess Club, pollinator programs, and weekly iPhone classes. Two new lecture series kicked off with wild success: The Sally Rhoads Lecture Series, featuring a talk by Lee Glazer, Director of Museum Programs at the National Archives, and Coming Together: Black History Is American History, presented by local teacher and lecturer Albert Cook. Both were met with packed, attentive audiences. To continue to try to meet our community's needs, many of 2023's programs were hybrid, allowing both virtual and in-person audiences.

For the first time since the library had to close its doors in 2020, we hosted a diverse array of art exhibits in the Steinberg Room going from highlighting local artists such as Doug Skinner, whose work has been featured in *Cabinet*, *Fate*, *The Fortean Times*, and *Nickelodeon*, to presenting art by Dominic Newsome, an inmate in Pennsylvania whose art was instrumental to his survival while in solitary confinement.

The reach of our programming allowed us the great pleasure of working with over 30 community partners, covering arts, gardening, wellness, and continuing education.

James Frauenberger Adult Programmer Staff began attending the Campus Market on the SUNY New Paltz campus in 2023. Over 100 SUNY students signed up for cards at our table.



We hosted two late-night programs for SUNY students in 2023 and had over 40 students take advantage of our space to study for finals.



Teen Programs in 2023: 60+

Participants: 200+



Scheduling programs for teens with busy academic schedules and a wide range of extracurricular activities can be difficult, but we've done a lot to engage them in 2023. Our programs gave teens opportunities for leadership and creative problem-solving, offered tools for academic growth, and provided an outlet for fun and relaxation.

Many of our programs were conceived of by our own Teen Advisory Group. These teens helped pave the way for video game, board game, and movie nights, as well as for Valentine's Day and Halloween parties. In 2023 they even helped usher in the first-ever marshmallow roast, Open Mic Night, and wildly successful Sleepover in the Stacks.

Mini Golf in the Stacks returned in 2023 with the theme, "Imaginary Worlds." Teen Advisory Group members designed and constructed nine holes throughout the library stacks and helped run the two-day event, which attracted **over 100** players.



Over the summer, high school and middle school students went to battle in the annual Mid-Hudson Battle of the Books. Each team read 5-6 books and prepared to answer trivia questions on each of them. Our high school team won third place in the finals!

This year we hosted a Jump Start Your College Application Series with Dwight Englewood School Director of College Counseling, Paola Gentry, who guided students in searching for the right college, navigating their applications, and writing their college essays. These were followed by drop-in help sessions where students could ask specific questions about their process.

It was a full and exciting year for teen programming! I'm looking forward to seeing how things will develop in 2024.

CHILDREN'S ROOM

Children's Programs in 2023: 257 142 programs more than 2022

Participants: 6000+ A 220% increase in program attendance from 2022

Circulation Increase: 27%

Children's programming underwent substantial growth this year. We significantly expanded our program offerings, particularly for babies and toddlers, in direct response to the expressed needs of our patrons and the identified gap in programming for this specific age group among local libraries. As these children transition to older age groups, there is a growing demand for increased toddler programs to meet their evolving needs. School-age programming experienced a boost in attendance throughout the year, as well, due to the introduction of new offerings such as the STEAM Stories program, various craft programs, and the Brick Builders program. This achievement is noteworthy, considering the difficulty in attracting this age group due to elementary students, busy schedules, and competing obligations, including various extracurricular activities.

Circulation increased significantly in 2023. The collection's inclusivity and diversity were also significantly improved, earning commendation from patrons. Numerous parents have expressed joy in seeing their children and families represented within the collection. The introduction of parenting materials, along with a focus on child development and early literacy for even the youngest babies, garnered praise as well.

Continuing the enhancements to the Children's Room, this year saw the addition of two new chairs, a fresh area rug, and new toys. Patrons consistently express how the new furniture and room configuration significantly contribute to the welcoming and inviting atmosphere of the space.

This annual report encapsulates the vibrant and diverse activities, enhancements, and community collaborations in the Children's Library throughout 2023.

Miss Kim Children's Librarian

The library remains dedicated to providing enriching experiences for all young patrons and their families.

In June of 2023, the kindergarten class from Duzine Elementary School visited the library. They received a tour, asked questions, and were able to sign up for a library card.



85% of the class of 2034 now have library cards.

HAVILAND-HEIDGERD HISTORICAL COLLECTION

Coming out from COVID made 2023 a very unique year for the Haviland-Heidgerd Historical Collection (HHHC). In many ways, researchers were eager to get back to work hammering us with queries that were unable to be answered online. Meanwhile, other patrons were eager to start projects that were delayed by the pandemic. Some patrons were still hesitant to travel and we received many notes from our out-of-town regulars that usually come and stay here for a week explaining their hesitancy. Hopefully, they will come in 2024. The pandemic certainly changed researching both local history and genealogy forever.

Our biggest accomplishment for the year is completing the \$349,999 National Endowment for the Humanities Collections and Reference Resources Implementation Grant that we were awarded in 2020. The New Paltz Historic Document Project was a collaboration between four New Paltz institutions with historical documents: HHHC, Historic Huguenot Street, the Town of New Paltz, and the Reformed Church of New Paltz. These documents include personal papers created or kept by individuals and families chiefly of southern Ulster County, falling into three major categories: legal and financial documents, military records from the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812, and family items. The majority of the papers date from the mid-1600s through 1830, with a few documents through the late 19th century included. **2,724** pages were digitized, of which 163 were single-page objects. These documents are now all online at New York Heritage: https://bit.ly/HHHCNYHeritage
